More news of charity posts

The Weare and District Scout Group from Somerset operated their Christmas 1996 postal service with a two tier pricing policy. The standard rate was 10p but customers also had the option of purchasing a 12p stamp with the additional 2p. being donated to Ethiopiaid. Both stamp designs show Father Christmas and the Scout badge and are printed in sheets of 20 in black on orange gummed paper and are imperforate.

Both stamps were priced at 20p. and are in diamond format, blue on blue paper in two designs, one featuring a Victorian lady cyclist and the other a vintage car. Produced in sheetlets of six, rouletted and containing three of each design, the sheetlet give various se-tenant and tête-bêche combinations with marginal inscriptions.

The organisation also produced an attractive FDC featuring the cyclist theme in red on cream paper with both stamps cancelled by a St Mary's Church date stamp.

Stamps are available at 20p. each or in multiples, pro rata, complete sheetlets cost £1 mint or 50p., cancelled to order, FDC's are 75p each and ordinary used envelopes are priced at 50p each.

Thematics at Stampex

The British Thematic Association coordinated a display put on by ten of its member societies at Stampex from 22 to 26 January.

The societies involved were The Bicycle Stamp Club, The Bird Stamp Society, The Exhibition Study Group, The Guild of St Gabriel, The Medical Philately Study Group, The Philatelic Music Circle, The Rose Stamp Society, The Scout and Guides Stamp Club, The Ship Stamp Society of Olympic Collectors and The United Nations Study Group. Visitors were invited to vote for

Visitors were invited to vote for the display which they most enjoyed and as a result The Ship Stamp Society was presented with the Crown Agents Stamp Bureau Trophy by Brian Sole Chairman of the British Thematic Association.

Besides the society displays, award-winning individual presentations included 'Waterfalls of the World.' 'The Grey Goose Wing' (Archery), 'History of Writing' and 'Bridging History.' While, In the Court of Honour, John Griffiths' Railways collection demonstrated to even the most dyed-in-the-wool traditional philatelist that there could be a lot more to thematic collecting than just pictorial stamps.

The attendance reported by the organisers of Stampex showed a sharp decline from last year with 11,683 visiting the show compared with 16,392 in 1996 but they express the hope that moving to a later week in 1998 (25 February to 1 March) will present a more attractive prospect. Autumn Stampex takes place from 17 to 21 September, again at the Business Design Centre, Islington.





The UCI President, Hein Verbruggen, had set the maximum distance for the race at 210km! This was a big advantage for the sprinters, at the cost of the strong riders with less sprint talents. The result of this decision saw riders riding home, or to the Hotel, to get more kms into the legs for further competitions. This short-sightedness clipped the wings of the strong road riders. The Ghent-Wevelgem and the Fleche Wallonne were victims under the UCI's plan and no longer retained World Cup status, to the advantage of totally new cycling races without tradition.

WALTHOURVILLE

What's in a name? The place got its name from a landowner - Mr. Walthour. He had twin grandsons, Robert and Jim who were both cyclists:

- Robert Sr (Bobby), (1878-1949) nicknamed the "Dixie Flyer", took part in 31 6-day races and won 17 of them; after this, he became the top motor-pace rider one of the greatest ever known. He was US Champion in 1902 & 3. In 1904 he rode in Europe and had 24 victories in 27 races, these included the World Championship in London, "Golden Wheel" in Paris and the "Grand Prix of Europe" in Berlin. In 1905, again in Europe, he won the World Championship in Antwerp, "Golden Wheel" in Paris and the "100 miles" in Paris. He became a regular racer in Europe with numerous victories against the best European champions: Grand Prix of Antwerp 1908 + 1913; Grand Prix of Germany 1904 + 1910 + 1913; Grand Prix of Berlin 1911; Grand Prix of Europe 1911 + 1912; Grand Prix of Leipzig 1913; Grand Prix of Dresden 1913. He was always welcomed in Germany, due to his German ancestry, and his command of the language.
- Bobby Jr, (1902-1980) was the US Amateur Track Champion in 1921. Winner of the Chicago 6-Day in 1925/6/7/8/9. In 1925 he was invited, along with his 6-Day partner, Fred Spencer, to the White House by President Calvin Coolidge, because of their great popularity. In 1926, partnered by Reggie MacNamara, they won the Chicago 6-Day with a unique performance their closest rivals were 6 laps behind!
- Bobby III was not attracted to cycling his favourite sport was swimming.
- Bobby IV became USCF Northern Californian Cycling Champion for the Kilo in 1986.
- Jim (Bobby Sr's twin) was the National 6-Day Champion in Garden.
- Jimmy Jr was the US Champion, road and track, in 1927. Had an incredible 6-Day record: 14 victories, 15 2nd places, 10 3rd places and 11 4th places in 87 races.

For your information, 6-Day races at that time were really cycling marathons, with one member of the team having to be on the track during the entire period (day and night), now they are only 6 evening events. The USA was once the top nation for 6-Day races.

** A Tribute to Sir Hubert Opperman

29.05.1904 - 18.04.1996

Born in Rochester, Victoria, Australia, Hubert discovered his cycling talent as a telegraph messenger. At the age of 16, his father, an ex racing cyclist, enrolled him in the local cycling club. The famous Australian Manager and Coach, Bruce Small, took care of "wonderboy".

He did everything, except one thing: he never gave up! He became a professional in 1922. In 1923 he was 1st in the Sales-Melbourne, Australian Motor-Pace Champion in 1924/5/6 and won the Montaggli-Melbourne and Goulburn-Sydney. He was the Australian Road Champion in 1924/6/7/9/33. Winner of Tour of Australia in 1927 - 1130km in 4 stages.

In 1928 he was invited to Europe by Henri Desgrange, founder and organiser of the "Tour de France". He travelled to Europe with 3 team-mates: Osborne, Watson and Bainbridge; the trip was funded by public subscription. "Oppy" came 3rd in the Paris-Brussels 1928 - behind two famous champions: Georges Ronse (Belgium), World Champion 1928/9, winner Bordeaux-Paris 1927/8/30 and Paris-Roubaix 1927; Nicolas Frantz (Luxembourg), winner Tour de France 1928/9 (he was so supreme, journalists called it the Tour of Frantz). He was 3rd in the Geneva Criterium, behind Walter Blattermann (Switzerland) and Pe Verhaegen (Belgium) and 3rd again, with team-mate Urago, in the 6-Days of Paris.

All these "preparations" were enough for Oppy to start the "Big Tour", where he finished 18th. The flat stages were a drudge for him, as they were all teams time trials, and he would be dragging his 3 team-mates along. Don't forget they were up against French, Belgian and Italian teams with industry backing.

The climax was his great victory in the "Bol d'Or" in Paris; a cycling marathon of 24hrs. He rode 950.06km, with a lead of 106 laps, on Mouton, Huot, Sellier and Urago. He asked the officials if he could continue to the 1000km mark - they agreed and he created a new record of 25h.19m.36s. During this epic ride he consumed 24 eggs, 24 bananas, 1kg raisins, 6L soft drink, 6L milk and 3L coffee - good appetite!

Back in Australia, after such a wonderful season, he conquered the Sydney-Melbourne record of MacLeod when, on November 29, he covered the 912km in 39h.42m. He invited the French riders, Mauclair and Jean Bidot, to ride in Australia. In the Sydney-Meibourne 5-stage race, Mauclair came 1st, Oppy 2nd and Bidot 3rd: Oppy got two stage victories. The Goulburn-Sydney was Oppy's victory and victory came again in the Tour of Tasmania in 3 stages, with Oppy 1st, Mauclair 2nd and Bidot 3rd; Oppy scoring one stage victory.

He returned to Europe in 1929, to prepare for the cycling marathon, Paris-Brest-Paris, with his teammates Lamb, Nicholsen and Thomas. The 3-stage Circuit of Bourbon race was a bull's eye, 2nd Guiramaud, 3rd Mazeyrat (he also won the 2nd stage). Triumph again in the Lyon-Geneva-Lyon, with a lead of 8mins on Mazeyrat and Cassin. A disappointment for our Australian favourite was the Bordeaux-Paris. He came 3rd in the Grand Prix of Marseille, in a motor-pace race behind his fellowcountryman Lamb (1st) and Peglion (2nd).

In the 1930 Tour de France, he rode well and was placed 12th, despite not having the support that was afforded his rivals. 1931 was unforgettable! The Paris-Brest-Paris, organised every ten years, was his great target and to win was his ambition. There were 33 participants - they staved together until Brest. On the return, 60km from Paris, Marcel Bidot (brother of Jean, and later French Team Manager of the French National Team in the Tour de France) attacked and quickly built a lead of 2mins but, a puncture proved fatal. At 45km from Paris, Oppy attacked and soon had a lead of 1m.30s. Bidot, Louyet, Decroix, Pancerat and Frantz pursued and caught Oppy, but then Frantz was dropped. In the sprint for the line, Oppy was 1st, 2nd Leon Louyet (3 lengths), 3rd Pancerat (at 4 lengths), 4th Emile Decroix (6 lengths), 5th Marcel Bidot (7 lengths). It was cycling history. 1186km in a record time of 49h.23m.30s; average speed 24.015kph - 50mins faster than Georget's record time. Only 12 riders finished.

1932, with no real competition, back in Australia, he attacked his favourite long-distance records:

May 23 & 24. Melbourne track motor-paced.

12hrs = 768km 361m16hrs = 1020km 810m

24hrs = 1367km 968m - beating Bouhours'

1906 record by 55km 335m

1000 miles (1609km) in 28h.55m.39s


In 1934 he visited England to beat some records! He attacked the Land's End to John O'Groats (1394km) record of 63h.22m, held by Rotsitter, and rode 57h.1m, an average speed of 24.4kph - think about it! 57 hours in the saddle, alone all the way! On doctor's advice, he slept, but only for 50mins and was not riding for a total of 4h.30m. Roads were paving-stones or gravel at that time! During the race he beat some other records:



Land's End to London ... 496km in 14h.9m London-York 314km in 9h.23m

> 390km 12hrs =

693km 656m 24hrs = 1000 miles (1609km) 73h.52m



1935, again in England, more new records: London-Bath-London...211 miles in 10h. 14m. 41s (an average speed of 33.048kph)

London-Bath-London ... on a tandem with E. Milleken, the 211 miles in 8h.55m.34s (an average speed of 37.944kph)

24hrs =749km 939m - this was set on Sept 2nd & 3rd

- 1936, Australia: Brisbane-Sydney 1048km in 47h.10m (average speed: 22.6 kph). Record previously held by Lee Cecil: 48h.
- 1937. England: London-Portsmouth ... 220.478km in 6h.33m.30s (average speed: 33.616 kph)

 Australia:Fremantle-Sydney4845.5km in 13 days 10 hours (5 days 8 hours better than Read's record). Almost unimaginable, considering the state of the roads at that time! Temperature varying from -3deg to +45deg (Celsius); sometimes dressed as an Eskimo, other times dressed in tropical gear. Record attempt supervised by Australian Cycling Federation officials.
- 1938. Australia: Adelaide-Sydney ...1671km in 68h 16m (average speed: 25.2km/h) In the same attempt, he also beat the 1000miles record in 63h.37m.30s.

1939, Australia: 24hour road record attempt 787.489km (average speed: 32.812kph).

A big salute to a wonderful cycling champion and athlete, nicknamed "The Kangaroo" in Europe, unbeatable over long distances! An example for young people and all of us ... never give up!

During WWII, he was a Flight Lieutenant (pilot) in the RAAF in the Pacific. In 1949 he found a new challenge in politics and won the Federal seat of Corio, Victoria, holding it for 17 years. Government Whip in 1955, Minister for Shipping and Transport 1960-63, Immigration Minister 1963-66 and High Commissioner to Malta 1967-72, he was Knighted in 1968: Sir Hubert OPPERMAN - what's in a name? In Flemish, it means "Superman", and in scouting "Chief Scout"! So, you see, you should not be surprised at his performance.

He left us, pedaling his exercise bike, at age 91, at his family home in Melbourne.
