

## Cyclo-Cross

During the cold winter months of the dawning years of 1900, packs of cyclists could be found roaming the forests and fields of the Parisian countryside. Pedalling along the winding cart-paths and jumping hedges and fallen trees, these backwoods excursions became a regular Sunday event for a young, French army private, by the name of Daniel Rousseau, and his friends.

Rousseau's initial jaunts were quiet communes with nature. But as the number of his companions reached into the dozens, impromptu racing occurred among the more sporting cyclists. Soon organized, though informal, events were scheduled and cyclo-cross was born.

In 1902 the French Cycling Union allowed Rousseau, who would later become secretary-general of that organization, to organize the first French championships, which were won by F. de Baeder. For years this "rough stuff" and "mud plugging" remained a French indulgence until its popularity exploded when Octave Lapize attributed his 1910 Tour de France win to the off-season sport that he had been participating in for some time. Suddenly every champion wanna-be that could bear a freezing wind was running through the woods, leaping logs with bikes hiked waist high or slung over a shoulder.



To give a chance to nationalities of cyclo-cross riders to compete against one another, the first International Criterium, was won by the Frenchman Gaston Degy, was held in Paris in 1924. Following Gaston to the podium in the following years were many of cycling's greats: Charles Pelissier in 1926, '27 and '28, Sylvere Maes, the handlebar namesake, in 1933, and Robert Oubron who won in 1937, '38, '41 and '42!

In 1950 one of the international events became the official World Championships, and in Paris the 1947 Tour winner, little Jean Robic, was the first to pull on the rainbow jersey. Like the International Criteriums, the World Championships saw many of cycling's brightest stars cross the finish line. But among them, Belgium's Eric de Vlaeminck was definitely king of the cycle-cross having, at the tender age of twenty, won in 1966 and then each year from 1968 to 1973.

During these years, the sport became quite specialized, with purpose-made frames and parts, and specific techniques for on-the-move mounting and dismounting, and running with the bike shouldered.

To the uninitiated, a quick glance at a cyclo-cross bike might just seem like a road bike with knobby tires. But on closer inspection there are a myriad of differences. As with all forms of cycling, there are new and old schools of thought and conservative and extreme points of view on the anatomy of a cyclo-cross bike. I'll try to touch briefly on both angles.

The Frame: Cyclo-cross frames have more relaxed angles than road bikes, have more top tube clearance, longer chain stays for stability and a higher bottom bracket for obstacle clearance. Increased fork rake for flexibility and a softer ride is also common. Generally, 'cross frames are about a half inch to an inch smaller than their road counterparts.

Several companies, like Alan, Pinarello, Gitane, Botranger, Rock Lobster, Redline, Bianchi, Cramerati, Orbit and Torelli, produce 'cross frames but, for a little more, cycle-cross riders can have a frame custommade. Some of the more well-known North American builders include Steelman, Merlin, Marinoni, Ibis, and Richard Sachs, but most road builders will make 'cross frames.

Wheels: Strong, uniformly-tensioned 36 spoke wheels are the old stand-by, but 32's cut weight and seem to work just fine. 28 spoke front wheels are used sometimes as well. Many companies have purpose-made tubulars, but with the hybrid bike boom, several great clincher choices are now available from the likes of Specialized, Continental, Michelin and many others. Tread patterns vary according to race or local conditions. Composite tri-spoke wheels are becoming more and more popular with top 'cross pros in extremely muddy conditions.

The quick shifting and easy to use Shimano STI and Campagnolo Ergo Power levers are becoming more popular on the 'cross circuit, but because of their lack of serviceability and inability to survive serious crashes, bar-end shifters are still the classic choice.

Gearing: There are as many gearing choices as there are riders. Five 1988 Cancel for the French Cyclo- and six-speed freewheels are still in use, with their widely spaced cogs and impeccable mud-sloughing characteristics. The popular eight and nine-speed cassettes have made their way to the 'cross circuits as well, though they are more prone to clogging in muddy conditions.

Some riders stick with the time-proven single chainring (with or without ring guards), but double chainrings are now in the majority. Some common gearing combos are a 39/53 with a 12-26, 42/50 with a 15-28, 42/48 with a 13-26, and straight blocks. Cyclo-cross bikes are geared higher than the typical mountain bike, because when it becomes too difficult to pedal, it's more efficient to get off and run.

Brakes: Because of their incredible stopping power and mud clearance, cantilever brakes are a must. Some riders prefer to have the left brake lever activate the rear brake so they can have more control over their speed during dismounts.

Pedals: The classic 'cross pedal is the French double-sided Lyotard with doubled Christophe clips and Binda straps, but Shimano's double-sided SPD's have all but replaced them.

Bars & Stem: Flat bars just can't compete with the variety of hand positions offered by the drop bar. For the added stability of a wider grip and for more leverage, some use flared drop or randonneur-type bars. Stems are slightly shorter than on a road bike to help distribute the rider's weight more efficiently during ascents and descents.

Water bottles: In racing, Water bottles and cages just don't exist. They get in the way of carrying the bike and the courses are usually short enough that one can get water "in the pits." It's common not to have any water bottle bosses brazed on a 'cross rig.

In her article titled "Spotlight on Cyclo-Cross" in the British weekly Cycling of September 27, 1961, Joan Green gave some details on equipment that the rider should have: "Every well-equipped cyclo-cross rider has a goodly supply of the following: - (a) webbed feet (for swimming through streams, ponds and floods), (b) gills (for the same purpose in extreme cases), (c) cloven hoofs (for wading over marshy ground as well as an accompaniment to the Devil-may-care attitude), (d) understanding friends (to tolerate him), (e) a willing mum (to do his washing for him)."

Cyclo-cross races are generally held on circuits one to two miles in length. The perfect course will have paved and unpaved sections, wet areas and dry, will be about 75% rideable, the rest for running. It will have a variety of natural obstacles, like muddy banks, streams, and fallen trees, and man-made obstacles, like bales of straw, wooden barriers, and even flights of stairs. Depending on your classification and age, the race will last around thirty to seventy-five minutes. After a season of multi-hour road and mountain races this may seem a short run, but for even the most prepared, this is a lung-blowing experience. Cyclo-cross is a very demanding, incredibly precise sport.

At a time when mountain biking is so popular, the question of why to take up cyclo-cross is often heard. There are basically three reasons to cross over. One is for the same reason you might, in this time of clinchers and STI, use sew-ups and down-tube shifters: history. Cyclo-cross has been around for about 70 years longer than its fat-tired grandchild. Its courses weave a rich tapestry of cycling heroes and two-wheeled feats. It's time tested and time proven.

Probably the main reason for taking up cyclo-cross is for training. Nothing can beat the incredible workout afforded the roadie by this off-season sport. It builds stunning upper-body strength and bike-handling skills that will eliminate the fear of rainy criteriums and gravel spotted roads, increases cardio-respiratory endurance, and takes up surprisingly little time since a one hour 'cross workout can be more advantageous than hours on mind-numbing rollers.

But the final reason is that its just plain fun! Nothing beats the quick handling and lively feel of the 'cross bike on the fastest descents and trickiest single track. The simplicity of a 'cross bike, and the very act of riding, running and walking, enable you, as Robert Oubron and René Chesal write in their book Cycliste 100%: Série Cyclo-Cross, "to discover hundreds of interesting things which you would have ridden straight past if you had not been tempted into hitching the bike over your shoulder, or simply pushing it along, and following a riverbed, or a footpath that may end in a spring or an unexpected view, or a lane that suddenly yields up some unexpected historical monument, or a lake you did not know existed.

...Just try doing this on a bridal path in Savoy or in the Pyrenees and I'll be surprised if you don't find yourself singing for sheer joy. And when you're back down again after clattering through streams and gullies and stony paths, sometimes on the bike, sometimes on your feet, you will have enjoyed a wonderful experience."

Indeed, utilizing cyclo-cross techniques can only enhance the bicycle tourist's experiences. Cyclo-cross is nearly as old as the bicycle itself, and as fresh and full of vigour as if it were born yesterday. It's a sport that enjoys rampant popularity in Europe, and in America, after its heyday of the late 1970s, is picking up momentum once again in areas rich in the traditions of road racing: Boulder, Boston, Chicago, Santa Cruz, Seattle and a myriad of other cities. It's been called a "fringe sport" and "outlandishly demanding," but at the same time some of cycling's greatest heroes, including numerous Tour de France winners, like five-time champion Bernard Hinault, have used it for winter conditioning.


#### WORLD CYCLO-CROSS CHAMPIONSHIPS

1999 Cyclo-cross World Championships.

The 1999 Cyclo-cross World Championship was held in Poprad - Spišská Teplica in Slovakia. The man depicted on the postcard is the excellent Slovak cyclist Ondrej Glajza. He is the only Slovak who won cyclo-cross World Championship gold medals – one in the junior (1984) and one in the amateur competitions (1989). Unfortunately, his challenging career among professionals was cancelled by a cruel knee problem.


The 1999 World Championship was held near his home in Poprad. The place was chosen thanks to Glajza's excellent sporting career and also due to the activities of his father and trainer Jan Glajza, who built the championships track. Jan founded a cycling club in Poprad, in which a lot of good cyclists grew up (road, track and terrain). The most recognised were his two sons Ondrej and Robert. Robert participated in the 1999 World Championship in the professional competition.

2001 Cyclo-cross World Championship.

The 2001 Cyclo-cross World Championships was held in Tábor in Czech republic. Two men depicted on the machine cancellation are two famous Czech cyclists Miloš Fišera (amateur cyclo-cross World Champion in 1981 and 1982, and 2nd in 1972) and Radomír Šimůnek (junior cyclo-cross World Champion in 1980, amateur cyclo-cross World Champion in 1983 and 1984, and 2nd in 1982 and 1989, professional cyclo-cross World Champion in 1991). Radomír Šimůnek also participated in the 2001 World Championships in the professional competition.

## Josef Kohout and Czech/Czechoslovak Cycling Movement.


Josef Kohout (1863-1946) was one of the most important people in Czech cycling in its first years. He was a cycling promoter, a co-founder of the first cycling bodies in Czech lands and a great sportsman.

Josef Kohout was the oldest of four "cycling" sons of Jan Kohout - the producer of the first Czech high-wheelers called "Kohoutovky" (replicas of English high-wheelers). They lived in Smichov, the part of Prague, where the Czech cycling movement was born. Josef's first sporting achievement was his high-wheeler ride (together with brother František) from Prague to Vienna (Austria) and back in 1880. They did the distance of about 500 kilometres within two-and-a-half days. The ride had a big impact on the promotion of cycling in the whole of Austria, especially in their home Czech lands. Another important date is January 2<sup>nd</sup> 1881, when Kohouts brothers participated in the foundation of the first cycling club in the Austro-Hungarian Empire, "Club of Czech Velocipedists of Smichov" = "Klub českých velocipedistů Smíchov" (Czech lands, as well as nowadays Slovakia, belonged to the dual state Austro-Hungarian Empire until 1918, Czech lands were part of Austria and Slovak lands were part of Hungary). In 1883 the Club gave birth to the national "Club of Czech Velocipedists" (headed by František Kohout), which was later transferred to the national "Czech Union of Velocipedists", later to the "Czechoslovak Union of Velocipedists" (more later to the official "Czechoslovak Cycling Federation").

Josef Kohout and his brothers continued to promote cycling by long distance touring and sporting achievements. In 1881, they took long rides from Prague to Linz, Salzburg and Munich, in 1884 Josef set the high-wheeler record in ride Hamburg-Flensburg-Hamburg (355km); in 1885 he did a long distance ride through Germany, France, England and Switzerland, during which he set the 24-hour high-wheeler record — 400 kilometres. In 1885, Josef rode 8150 kilometres in total on his high-wheeler. The most important sporting victory Josef achieved was in 1882, when he won the first Austro-Hungarian international cycling championships — 1-mile race (1609 metres) in 2:46,6 min.

During their lives Josef and his brothers won many races and became multiple Czech cycling champions. However, their most important activities were the promotion of cycling, founding regular cycling bodies and spreading cycling among the masses.
