Write a letter

So long as the Chinese and Japanese use a system of ideograms rather than an alphabet in the western sense, there will always be a need for 'snail mail'—a paradox, considering Japan's prominent role in the computer industry. Although the Japanese language lends itself well to voice mail, the written word will continue to depend on many thousands of characters. All Japanese children are expected to master the 881 most essential characters by the time they are about ten years old, while there are a further 969 characters prescribed by law for general publication, and it is widely accepted that a working knowledge of at least 4000 characters is required in order to read a newspaper.

It is small wonder, therefore, that the government actively encourages the art of letter-writing, through the Letter Writing Day (the 23rd of each month). July is Letter Writing Month and for many years now stamps have been released each 23 July. As has been the case since 1999, the motifs for the latest series were designed by the renowned Dutch cartoonist, Dick Bruna. There are four 50y. stamps in a se-tenant strip and five 80y. stamps in a conventional rectangular format, but there are also two circular, an oval, an elongated oval and a triangular – the last-named the first of this shape from Japan. The stamps show Bruna's inimitable figures, with the inscription fumi-no-hi (letter writing day) in Japanese characters.

Differdange (17.659 habitants, au sud-ouest de Luxembourg-Ville)

L'abbaye Fontaine Marie de Differdange de l'Ordre de Citeaux, filiation de Clairvaux avait été fondée par Alexandre de Soleuvre. Le couvent était réservé aux jeunes filles de familles nobles.



Le bâtiment qui subsiste et qui est reproduit sur le timbre a été élevé par l'abbesse Françoise de Gourcy (1719 - 1843). Elle fit sculpter ses armoiries dans le fronton central. Après la suppression du couvent par la loi républicaine, le domaine fut vendu comme bien national pour appartenir successivement à différentes familles aisées.

La ville de Differdange acheta l'immeuble en 1929 pour y installer un hospice civil. En 1981, l'Etat en fit l'acquisition et l'hôpital devint Maison des Soins. Les récents travaux de restauration de l'ancien corps de logis (1997 - 2000) rendent à cette vieille bâtisse toute sa splendeur d'antan, toute la noblesse de son architecture.



Mamer (4.892 habitants, à l'ouest de Luxembourg-Ville)

Depuis le 1^{er} mars 2002 l'administration communale de Mamer est installée dans le château entièrement restauré qui est reproduit

sur notre timbre. Le château est agrémenté à

l'arrière d'un petit parc, où figurent deux sculptures à la mémoire de deux grands sportifs de Mamer, Nicolas Frantz, double vainqueur du Tour de France, et Josy Barthel, champion olympique.


Les origines du château de Mamer remortent loin dans le passé. En 960, la comtesse Liutgardis fit don du hameau de Mamer à l'abbaye St. Maximin de Trèves. A



cette époque il y avait déjà une construction sur le site de l'actuel château.

Frédéric François, jadis un des plus hauts fonctionnaires du pays, reconstruisit le château en 1830 sous sa forme actuelle. En 1995, l'Immeuble fut acquis par la commune de Mamer et le conseil communal décida de restaurer le « Mamer Schlass » pour en faire la maison communale.





ONCE: 50th Anniversary (1988) - A forgotten Spanish stamp?

In several BSC magazines there have appeared some articles about what you collect. My own criteria is: anything that appears on a stamp which directs your mind towards a bicycle or cycling theme would be included in my topical collection. This includes writers, sculptures, inventors - but everyone has his own criteria on what he collects and what a bicycle stamp is.

A new stamp was issued in 1998 by The Netherlands, commemorating the 100th Anniversary of Rabobank. I don't have any doubt about the bicycle topical interest of this stamp. This stamp appeared in a BSC magazine as a bicycle stamp and in stamps lists too. Nobody has noted the same case for the 1988 Spanish stamp commemorating the 50th anniversary of ONCE. The difference between these two stamps is that the Spanish one was issued previously to the relationship of ONCE with cycling. This organisation has sponsored a professional bicycle team since 1989 and it has become one of the most important professional teams. ONCE's riders have won important races and won the team classification in the Tour de France. In the 2001Tour de France, for example, the ONCE team won the Team classification and the Teams Time Trial and the team's leader, Joseba Beloki, finished second to Lance Armstrong. In 2002 he was second again.

ONCE is the acronym of Organización Nacional de Ciegos de España (Spanish Organisation of Blind People), and was founded by the Spanish dictator Francisco Franco. When it was founded they Immediately started a lottery in order to obtain founds to create specific schools and medical services, promote the integration of blind people into the society and into the job environment, all for the benefit of the blind people. Now it is a great organisation, capable of sponsoring a professional bicycle team or to promote and sponsor the paralympic sports in Spain.

This stamp was issued on the 26th December of 1988 and depicts a face without eyes, a fragment of Braille language spelling the capitals "ONCE" and the organisation's logo: a blind man with his characteristic white walking-stick.

The team has included the following riders:

Joseba BELOKI (ESP): Three times on the podium in the Tour de France; winner of the Volta a Catalunya.



Abraham OLANO (ESP): World Championship winner; Olympic winner; podium and yellow jersey in the Tour de France and Giro d'Italia; Winner of the Tour of Spain. Depicted on stamps issued by Central Africa on 25/08/1998 and 29/09/1999.

Alex ZULLE (SUI): podium and yellow jersey in the Tour de France and winner of Tour of Spain.

Laurent JALABERT (FRA): Climb winner and yellow jersey in the Tour de France and winner of Tour of Catalonia and Spain.

Johan BRUYNEEL (BEL): Team Manager of US POSTAL team which includes Lance Armstrong.

Eduardo CHOZAS (ESP): winner of Alpe d'Huez stage in the Tour de France. As a winner, his name is written on one of the bends on the climb.

Marino LEJARRETA (ESP): winner of Tour of Spain.

Melcior MAURI (ESP): winner of Tour of Spain.

Juan LLANERAS (ESP): Olympic champion and World Champion winner in track racing.



Editor's note:

Jordi has explained his own definition of what he perceives to be a "Bicycle Stamp". I have deliberated many times on this subject and had many exchanges of correspondence with the late Douglas Marchant on the topic - see "Definition of a "Bicycle Stamp", BS24A p8, see also "Obtuse Connections" by Ron Sant BS24B p14 and "Obtuse Connections - my Findings" by Vojtech Jankovic BS26 p20.

We actually don't really collect "Bicycle" Stamps as such, we all include velocipedes, uni, tri and quad cycles. The strict meaning of "Bicycle" is "a two-wheeled pedal-driven vehicle". Then there are recumbents, hand-driven cycles, scooters, etc. We can't say 'human-driven' because I'm sure you have all got animals riding cycles.

Then there are 'photo's of velodromes and portraits of famous cyclists - but the word "famous" can lead to some problems, there is for example the stamp showing Astrid Lindgren, author of "Lotta's Bike" (see BS20A p9) and also the one showing William Saroyan, author of "The Bicycle Rider in Beverly Hills"; both, to a collector not knowing their literary achievements would, by examining their stamps, fail to see any connection to cycling. Included in this category would be the stamp showing Dr Paul Dudley White MD (see BS18B p21) whose contribution to cycling was his being "the only 'spokesman' around in the 1950's " for cycling in the Unites States.


I must ask you, when you first view the stamp illustrated on the right do you immediately see a "bicycle stamp"?

This stamp is the Danish issue of 05/19/90 - "Fredricia: Town for Everybody" - I have been advised that the inscription in Braille on this stamp includes the words "improved access for the handicapped, children, pedestrians and cyclists".

Once again, it's really up to you as individuals whether you include such stamps in your collection.

Returning to Jordi's article, I do not agree that the Rabobank issue appeared in BS or in any lists I have seen.

One further thing. Over the years, the controlling body for world cycling, the UCI, have considered what exactly is a bicycle? Below is an extract from their rules that you find interesting...

SECTION 2 BICYCLES

Preamble

Bicycles shall comply with the spirit and principle of cycling as a sport. The spirit suggests that cyclists compete in competitions on an equal footing. The principle asserts the primacy of man over machine.

Principles

Definition

1.3.006 The bicycle is a vehicle with two wheels of equal diameter, The front wheel shall be steerable; the rear wheel shall be driven through a system comprising pedals and a chain,

Type

1.3.007 Bicycles and their accessories shall be of a type that is or could be sold for use by anyone practising cycling as a sport. The use of equipment designed especially for the attainment of a particular performance (record or other) shall be not authorised.

Position

1.3.008 The rider shall normally assume a sitting position on the bicycle. This position requires that he be supported solely by the pedals, the saddle and the handlebar.

Steering

1.3.009 The bicycle should have a handlebar which allows it to be ridden and manoeuvred in any circumstances and in complete safety.

Propulsion

1.3.010 The bicycle shall be propelled solely, through a chainset, by legs moving in a circular movement.



Bicycles and Motorcycles



Bicycles

The Post Office bought or hired a few early bicycles or 'velocipedes', which cost £6 to £8 each, prior to 1880. However, their trials failed, mainly because it was difficult to find men fit enough to ride the bicycles. In 1880, two tricycle posts were used as an experiment in Coventry, because it was thought that it was less tiring to ride a tricycle. The Post Office paid the riders a weekly allowance of five shillings for the tricycles' purchase and maintenance.

In 1882, Edward Burstow, a Horsham architect, invented the 'Centre Cycle'. Nicknamed the 'Hen and Chickens' it had a large central wheel and two small wheels at each end, and brackets above the small wheels supported a basket for mail at each end. In 1883, following the introduction of the parcel post, this type was used for the increasing loads in rural areas. It was apparently successful in Horsham, but less encouraging reports from other areas ended the experiment.

Between 1883 and 1895, bicycles and tricycles were used on a trial basis for carrying post and telegram deliveries. By 1895, sixty-seven cycle posts had been established throughout the country, using bicycles and tricycles provided by their riders. The riders received a weekly allowance in return. In 1895, the number of cycles used led to the weekly allowance being fixed at four shillings per rider.

Post Office bicycles were first officially introduced in 1896, when 100 were bought, largely to cope with the extension of the radius for the free delivery of telegrams from one to three miles. After this initial purchase, bicycles were specially made for the Post Office. However, this only lasted until 1904 when the Post Office specification was abandoned because many cycle manufacturers felt unable to produce the design which required special machinery. Manufacturers were therefore asked to produce quotes for bicycles of their own specifications, provided that they were suitable for Post Office work. As a result, from 1904 the Post Office used various designs, gaining experience about each type's advantages and disadvantages. However, maintenance problems arose because separate stocks of parts were needed and the Post Office decided to return to a standard design.

In 1929, the standard cycle was introduced, and annual purchases changed the whole fleet to this standard by about 1935. The 1929 design was used until 1992. Postal cycles had free-wheels and two brakes whereas telegraph cycles had a fixed wheel. The cycles, usually painted red, were required to carry loads weighing up to 50lbs, and had to last at least four years.

A booklet entitled *The Cycle Handbook* was available at every office to assist Postmasters and others in the management of their cycles. The riders were responsible for keeping the cycles in good condition, and were supplied with a card entitled 'How to use and take care of Post Office Cycles.' Repairs were carried out by local tradesmen with parts supplied by the Post Office.

In 1977, W R Pashley of Stafford became the main supplier of bicycles to the Post Office. In 1990, 55 prototypes of a three-speed bicycle, developed by that company, were tested. The new design, the first since 1929, had a lighter frame, plastic mudguards and all-weather hub brakes. A plastic container for mail was carried at the front. The new design, introduced nation-wide on 22 September 1992, was intended to gradually replace the Royal Mail's fleet of 35,000 'boneshakers' as they wore out. In January 1993 an electric motor was introduced for going uphill or when carrying a heavy load. However, postmen still had to pedal when going downhill or on flat stretches.

Motorcycles

During the early part of the twentieth century, experiments were made in the use of motorcycles. In 1903, a motor tricycle was on trial in London and in about 1910, a postman on a rural service near Watford used a petrol motor auto-wheel device attached to a bicycle.

By 1913, some Post Office staff used private motorcycles for their official duties. They were paid an allowance of three pence a mile for use of the vehicles. The following year, motorcycles were provided by the Post Office on an experimental basis. Twenty heavy motorcycle combinations were bought, comprising ten New Hudsons, six Douglases and four Rovers. They were all single-cylinder machines of 3ft horse-power with wicker or metal

side-carriers. They were introduced on rural collections and deliveries to replace postmen on horseback. However, between 1914 and 1919 the experiment was suspended, due to wartime petrol rationing.

In 1919, the use of motorcycles by the Post Office was resumed, and more powerful, twin cylinder, machines were introduced. In 1920, another trial with the auto-wheel device, attached to a bicycle, took place in Douglas. The start of the 1920s was the beginning of the Post Office's motor transport scheme, during which it purchased Matchless, Triumph, BSA, Enfield, Douglas, Clyno and Chater Lea motorcycles. BSA was found to be the best for price and quality and acted as supplier to the Post Office for a number of years.

In 1924, light solo motorcycles and light motorcycle combinations were first used experimentally to carry post. The combinations were slightly more expensive to operate but were more satisfactory and by the early 1930s were gradually replacing the solo motorcycles. By 1925, 400 twin cylinder motorcycles were in use, in all types of postal work.

Following experiments in Leeds in 1933, motorcycles were soon adopted by telegraph messengers. However, only messengers over 17 who had their parents' consent and a declaration of fitness from a doctor were eligible for riding

Until the 1960s, companies such as BSA and Raleigh supplied motorcycles to the Post Office. In September 1967, fifty Raleigh Supermatic mopeds, modified for Post Office use, were introduced. Earlier trials of mopeds had shown they were suitable for rural collections and deliveries, deliveries on housing estates on the outskirts of towns, patrol and inquiry work and telephone kiosk cleaning. In the 1970s, BSA and Raleigh gave way to makes such as Honda. The Honda VT500 was used from 1988, and the Kawasaki GT500 from 1989. The Honda SH50 City Express moped was used from 1993, mainly for low volume deliveries in towns or rural areas.

Bicycles and Motorcycles (November 2002)

HOW TO USE AND TAKE CARE OF POST OFFICE CYCLES

BICYCLES NOT TO BE LENT

1. Bicycles belonging to the Post Office are to be used for Departmental business only. They must not be lent to anyone not employed by the Department, nor any officer of the Department, except by the authority of a responsible officer.

CONDITION OF MACHINES

2. Before a machine is taken out for its first journey on any day, it must be presented for inspection to the proper officer, who will see that it is in good condition.

3. Tyres should be inflated almost "board hard", so that the tread (i.e. the pattern) alone is in contact with the road when the rider is in the saddle.

Care must be taken that the tyres do not rub against the frame.

The brakes must be tested before every journey, and if out of order must be put right before the bicycle is used.

No more than 4½ inches of the handlebar stem and 5 inches of the saddle pillar should protrude out of the frame.

The saddle top should be kept taut.

RULES OF THE ROAD

8. Make yourself familiar with the rules of the Highway Code in particular:

(a) Before moving off, make sure that it is safe to do so and not inconvenient to other road users. Watch particularly the

(b) Keep well to the left except when overtaking or turning right.

Give signals correctly, clearly and in good time. (d) Before overtaking make sure it is safe to do so.

(e) Do not overtake (i) at or near a corner, road junction or pedestrian crossing; (ii) when approaching the brow of a hill or a hump-back bridge; (iii) where the road narrows or when to do so would force other vehicles to swerve or reduce speed.

When turning right signal in good time and take up position just left of the middle of the road.

Where the traffic is congested, dismount and walk. On no account ride in and out of vehicles in a traffic block.

(h) Where there is a Halt sign stop at the major road, even if there is no traffic on it.

Do not hold on to a motor vehicle or trailer in motion.

Do not ride close behind a moving vehicle.

On no account ride on the footpath.

When singing the bell, do so at a reasonable distance behind a person or vehicle. Special care should be exercised if it is evident that the warning is not heard or is disregarded.

CONSIDERATION FOR PEDESTRIANS

9. Give way to pedestrians on uncontrolled zebra crossings. They have the right of way. Signal your intention to slow down or stop.

At pedestrian crossings controlled by lights or police give way to pedestrians on the crossing when the signal to move is given. Watch for pedestrians coming out suddenly from behind stationary vehicles. Be specially careful near schools, bus and tram * stops and pedestrian crossings.

SPEED

10. Never ride faster than is consistent with your own safety and the safety and convenience of other users of the road. Exercise special care on rough or slippery roads, and in foggy weather.

DESCENDING HILLS

11. Apply gradually both brakes at the same time and at the very commencement of the descent. The sudden application of a brake or brakes often causes an accident. When riding down a hill the feet must not be taken off the pedals. Dismount and walk down steep and dangerous hills.

RACING, CARRIAGE OF OTHER PERSONS, &c.

12. A rider must not race, nor ride in company with others. He must not allow another person to ride with him on a bicycle, nor must he use the machine for practising tricks. While riding, another machine must not be trailed or carried.

LEAVING BICYCLES WHEN DELIVERING A TELEGRAM, &c.

13. As far as possible the bicycle should be kept in sight when it is necessary for the rider to leave it. Whenever the bicycle has to be left it should be placed in a position of safety so that it cannot readily fall over or be damaged by passing traffic.

USE OF LAMPS

14. Lamps must receive attention daily as directed in "Instructions for Cyclists and Inspecting Officers Rg. 104". They must be switched on at the proper time, i.e., not later than half an hour after sunset until half an hour before sunrise. Also lamps should be switched on whenever the circumstances call for safety measures in this direction.

IF AN ACCIDENT HAPPENS

15. All accidents must be reported. The report should be made on form P694G, a copy of which must be carried by each officer employed on cycling duty. Full particulars as to what led to the accident, and when and where it happened, must be noted. The names and addresses of all concerned in the accident and of any available witnesses, must be obtained, and particulars furnished to the responsible officer on return to the Office. If the rider is injured, however slightly, an entry should be made in the Accident Book.

If any part of the bicycle, or any cycle appliance, is broken or lost, the matter must be reported at once.



TYRES

16. The tyres should be carefully examined at least twice a week for cuts, holes, &c., and any thorns, flints, or other substances which may be found adhering, should be removed.

STORING

17. Bicycles must be kept in a place that is dry and not subject to extreme heat or cold; they must not be left near a fire or hotwater pipe, as this would injure the tyres.

CLEANING AND OILING

18. A bicycle when wet or muddy must never be put away for the night, or even for a few hours, without attention. Mud should be removed at once, and the various parts, except the tyres and rims, should be wiped over with an oily rag; the thorough cleaning of the machine can be postponed.

 The daily cleaning may be restricted, as a rule, to removing surface dirt and dust.
 The bicycle must be cleaned and oiled thoroughly once a week. Failure to do this may result in the Cleaning Allowance being (For detailed instructions on "Cleaning and Oiling", see "Instructions for Cyclists and Inspecting Officers Rg. 104"). Regular oiling of all parts ensures easier running.

21. Be very careful not to let the oil come in contact with the tyres and rims.

INSTRUCTION BOOKLET

22. An instruction booklet, Rg. 104, dealing with cleaning, oiling, methods of adjustment, &c., is supplied to enable riders to understand their bicycles. It may be obtained upon application to the officer in charge of cycles, and every rider should be in possession of a copy.


PROTECTIVE CLOTHING

23. When protective clothing is carried on a bicycle it must be securely fastened so that there is no danger of its entanglement in the machine. Straps for the purpose are supplied, on application.





WORLD CYCLE CROSS CHAMPIONSHIP

Spain is slowly becoming a world sports event headquarters and the Stamp Issuing Program Committee and other Postal Depts are focusin on this fact by printing commemorative stamps. Last year it was the World Athletics Cup, and the previous year it was the World Skate Hockey Championship and now it is the World Cycle Cross Championship, which will be held in the village of Getzu, where its headquarters are located.

Cycle Cross is a form of sport which combines cycling and foot racing. After a smooth stretch of highway, the participants will run cross-country, through difficult terrain and even wade across streams, alternating pedaling and racing on foot.

The commemorative stamp shows the championship's logo and the symbolic image of a participant and the facade of City Hall in the Biscayan town where this Championship takes place. Primo de Rivera held a Cabinet Meeting in this building the year after it was built. Construction was directed by Ignacio Smith, in 1928, according to Fidel Iturria's drawings. The facade is made up of a central body and an ornate staircase, and two side sections in the shape of towers.

- **Thematica** For the benefit of those members who might be able to attend, Britain's thematic show, will take place on Saturday and Sunday, 28th and 29th June 2003 at Carisbrooke Hall, 63 Seymour Street, London, a short walk from Marble Arch. Opening hours are: 10.30am to 5.30pm Sat and 10.30 to 5.00pm Sun.
- * St Petersburg 2003 Brian Sole has informed us that he has been appointed the British Commissioner for this Russian International Philatelic Exhibition, which will run from 7-14th November 2003. For further details please contact Brian.
- * Groszy Tadeusz Zmudzinski has received requests from members regarding information about the Polish overprinted Groszy stamps. Tadeusz explains that, as the Groszy hand-stamped overprint was introduced on the 28.20.1950 due to currency conversions, those stamps that exist with this overprint prior to that date would be illegal, eg: how can you have a stamp issued on 01.05.1948, legally have an overprint that was not introduced until 1950? (I think this subject needs further investigation..)
- * Triathlon Further to our previous observations on this subject, Terry Crawford has written to say "I agree that a stamp featuring triathlon in general and not showing cycling is not a bicycle stamp. But a pedant might argue that a stamp that commemorates a specific triathlon event including cycling (such as in the Olympic games) but that does not include an image or word relating to cycling might be! And sooner or later there'll be a stamp that shows a medal-winning triathlete during the running or swimming phase who later in his or her career becomes famous as a cyclist."!!
- ***** Gimmick or Advanced stamp design (from GSM Jan. 2003) Remember Gibraltar's recent stamp issue which incorporated real rock in the stamp production? When you ran your fingers over the image of the Rock of Gibraltar you could feel the rocks. Correo Argentino (Argentine Post) has now produced a similar effect but not with 'real' rocks in this instance they have used 'netting'. A set of 4 stamps was issued on 28.09.2002 commemorating the Men's World Volleyball Championships. Each stamp incorporated an image of the match net with the mesh of the net printed 'proud' of the background. This too can be felt if you run your fingers over the net shown on the stamp.
- Snippets I couldn't help but put these little gems in to brighten your day...

- * Challenges Some of the challenges that postal administrators in general face. The core product has been around for a long time first class mail or the equivalent in other countries. That's paid for infrastructure and while that's been their bread and butter product they have had universal service obligations that they must do things even if they are-not profitable.

The USPS have to deliver to the bottom of the Grand Canyon. They use a mule train to go there every day and its damn expensive. They are obliged to deliver to the Eskimo villages in Alaska, and they do so by special planes. It's much more expensive than delivering in a city but that's part of the universal service and part of the charter that every citizen has the right to receive mail. In the past when postal services had the monopoly on the delivery of mail, things worked fine. In today's market place there's a lot of competition on that monopoly. There's the Internet, email, fax, and online banking. You name it. So then growth in that product, which is the bread and butter, has slowed down considerably. As long as there is a universal service obligation postal services will have to continually raise prices and when this happens you lose more volume based on price elasticity.

When did this begin to happen; Email and fax started to eat into the business during the I980s. In the United States during the 1980s first class mail grew about 5 per cent per year. During the 1990s this fell to about 1per cent,' So between the 80s and 90s they lost 4 per cent growth on over half the-First Class volume.

The Future of Stamps - Print your own - Emma Nash (GSM April 2003) reports that UK businesses and consumers could be buying electronic stamps on the internet by the end of this year, if Royal Mail trials prove successful. Tests are due to start within the next three months.

'You will be able to buy stamps online and print them on your printer,' Royal Mail information systems director, Paul Kelsall, recently told Computing magazine. 'You will also be able to put your logo or a picture next to it.'

The technology is being developed by Lockheed Martin, the company which supplies Royal Mail with its sorting machines. 'It has to interface with the mail sorting machinery so that when an electronic stamp hasn't been paid for, it can identify that,' said Kelsall. The 'stamps' will contain encryption technology to reduce potential fraud. When an electronic stamp is printed, the cost will automatically be deducted from the customer's account.

Royal Mail is enthusiastic about the arrival of electronic stamps, but is being cautious about their potential. 'We are obviously getting into this because we think people want the convenience that will be introduced with it', explained Kelsall. 'But this is only a trial. We need to check usability and take-up, which is important.' The stamps will be designed to work with common PC applications such as Microsoft Word and Excel.

- * Removing cancellation marks Russ Bissett wants to know if anyone can recommend a sure and safe way to remove cancellation marks from stamps. He has some on which the cancel ink is rather dark and thick. Can anyone help him??

A NEW development in postal deliveries is A Cycle Post. being tried at Grantham, where, in order to serve a group of villages embraced in a circuit of several miles, the Post Office has established a cycle post. A mounted postman leaves the Grantham head post office daily at 12.30 p.m., taking letters and parcels for delivery in Little Ponton, Great Ponton, Rochford, Colsterworth, Stainby, Sewstern, Buckminster, and Skillington. The bicycle is specially constructed for postal purposes, and is enamelled in "pillar-box red." The prompt delivery by this means is much appreciated in the district served.
