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# **Editorial**

The annual cost of producing two issues of *Bicycle Stamps* instead of 4 issues has helped create a small surplus each year and has meant membership fees remained unchanged. However the surplus has now reached a few hundred pounds. After consultation with Steve Andreasen, our American Treasurer, we are granting twelve months free membership to all, as shown in the "Renewed to" date in the Club Roster September 2019. Once again I am grateful to Thomas Matthies for providing the "New issues" pages. Thomas also helps me by providing a PDF of each issue, which I then forward by email to a few members who prefer to see a colour version on their home computer.

It was some time ago that Ernie Clayton provided some Berlin-Warsaw-Prague slogans, just after the listing stopped at 1972. Two pages of his slogar appear now. Thanks Ernie. I hope many of you are making use of the website set up by Jordi Quintana. It has now been in existence for 12 months and the domain name has just been renewed for 5 years. There are articles this time on the USA Special Delivery stamps and examples of the Paris Pneumatic Mail stationery, used in Algiers. With the Olympics and Paralympics due in a few months time, there are some philatelic examples from past Games.

I have included 3 postcards issued by the German Cyclists' Federation in the nineteenth century from the collection of the late Fred Goatcher. He ran a competition, through the Cyclists' Touring Club, for a stamp to celebrate the CTC's 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 1978. A set of 4 cycle stamps was issued and the winning design became the official F.D.I. handstamp of a touring cyclist in the shadow of an Ordinary (Penny Farthing) cyclist.

I have omitted the 2 advertisements this issue but Piet Hein Hilarides is a dealer in cycle stamps and author of a bicycle stamp catalogue. His details are on the front cover.

If a WNS no. is known it is stated (e.g. "[LR024.09]"). The WNS no. documents, that it is definitely a legal issue.




Uruguay: alternative sketches for "Sistema de Bicisendas" by designer Martín Azambuia



# Sydney



E 23 SEPTEMBRE 1993, les membres du Comité international olympique réunis à Monte-Carlo désignaient Sydney comme ville hôte des Jeux de la XXVIIº Olympiade. Située sur l'une des plus belles baies du monde, la plus vaste et plus ancienne ville d'Australie accueille donc quelque 10 000 athlètes venus de près de 200 pays, du 15 septembre au 1er octobre 2000. Les Jeux Paralympiques se tiendront quelques jours plus tard également à Sydney.

C'est en 1896 que les Jeux Olympiques de l'ère moderne sont célébrés pour la première fois, à Athènes, sous l'impulsion du Français Pierre de Coubertin. D'abord constitués d'une seule édition intitulée « les jeux de l'Olympiade » (Jeux d'été), les JO s'étendent plus tard à de nouvelles disciplines avec la création d'une édition hivernale. Chacun des deux vient consacrer une Olympiade de quatre années. Les deux éditions se sont tenues la même année jusqu'en 1992 et se déroulent, depuis, à deux ans d'intervalle. Ainsi, les derniers Jeux d'été ont eu lieu en 1996 à Atlanta, ceux d'hiver en 1998 à Nagano. Les prochains Jeux d'hiver se tiendront à Salt Lake City en 2002 et le rendez-vous estival de 2004 sera célébré dans le berceau de l'Olympisme, à Athènes.

Après avoir mobilisé ses 3,9 millions d'habitants pour soutenir sa candidature, la ville de Sydney a tout mis en œuvre pour offrir aux athlètes et aux visiteurs le meilleur environnement pour partager le plaisir du sport. Théâtre central des Jeux de Sydney, le stade olympique sera le plus grand site en plein air de l'histoire des JO,


avec une capacité de 110 000 spectateurs.

Pour réduire au minimum les déplacements lors des compétitions et assurer aux athlètes comme au public des conditions optimales de confort, 21 des 28 disciplines olympiques seront concentrées dans

deux zones distantes de seulement 14 km.

Le 15 septembre, des milliards de téléspectateurs et d'auditeurs pourront suivre en direct la cérémonie d'ouverture des Jeux, et se préparer à vibrer ensemble à ce rassemblement de toute la jeunesse du monde.


Par-delà les Jeux de Sydney, le mouvement olympique français célébrera le centenaire des JO de Paris, ainsi que la mort d'Henri Didon, fidèle ami de Pierre de Coubertin, et inventeur, en 1891, de la devise olympique « Citus, Altius, Fortius ». Prieur du collège Albert-le-Grand à Arcueil, Henri Didon fut un grand précurseur du sport. Il formula de façon moderne l'idée que le sport peut jouer un rôle de catalyseur dans l'œuvre éducative et l'institution de la paix grâce aux Jeux Olympiques.



# LOOKING BACK TO THE OLYMPIC AND PARALYMPIC GAMES LONDON 2012

The 3rd Olympic issue on 27 Jul 2010 included a cycle stamp and 9 other sports. The same cycle stamp was included in a pack of 5 stamps and 5 postcards (right) and a stamp coin pack (below). A self adhesive cycle stamp was issued in a booklet 12 Oct 2008.








#### **ROYAL MAIL'S MILLENNIUM COLLECTION 2000**

ART & CRAFT was the title of Royal Mail's fifth millennium set for 2000.

The 45p stamp depicts the Cycle Network Artworks. Grants of 435 million pounds supported the National Cycle network, a major Millennium project which involved over 3,000 miles of construction spanning the country from the North of Scotland to the South East and South West of England & through Wales and Northern Ireland. Stamp photogravure printed by Enschedé.




This cylinder block was issued in a special pack by Royal Mail whilst the stamp was on sale.

## THE SPEEDY, HISTORY OF U. S. SPECIAL DELIVERY SERVICE

This is the title of a Book by Henry M. Gobie and published by his wife Wilhemina, copyright 1976. It is a hard back book of almost 300 pages describing the United States Special Delivery stamps issued between 1885 and 1971. The Bicycle Special Delivery stamps, 1902 -1917, are described in detail in Part II, which also includes 13 pages of the USA Postal Law and regulations, 1902, pertaining to the Special Delivery Service.

Mr Ostrender Smith, a Bureau artist and former Chief Designer for the American Banknote Company, suggested that the new stamp should show a messenger mounted on a bicycle. The suggestion was accepted and Mr Smith was photographed astride a Post Office bicycle to produce a rough first draft for the new stamp. A boy messenger's uniform and cap were substituted in the final artwork.

The die for the new 10c ultramarine stamp was engraved by Ponickau and Ellis and was first issued December 9, 1902, on double lined watermarked paper, perf. 12, one hundred stamps to a plate. Scott's catalogue number is E6 and Scott records the plate numbers as 1481, 1482, 1483, 1484, 1773, 1774, 1775 and 1776.

Postmasters had to comply with the 1902, and subsequent Regulations but it is clear that different interpretations applied. A brief summary follows,

- 1. The Special Delivery charge was 10 cents prepaid by the Special Delivery stamp plus the normal postage charge.
- 2. Letters bearing Special Delivery stamps had to be marked with a number and a record kept, which included the time of arrival. A messenger force was employed to carry out Special Deliveries immediately, if within one mile of the Special Delivery Office. The carrier-delivery limit applied at smaller Post Offices. If outside these limits items had to be forwarded in the next despatch.
- 3. Boy messengers from the age of 13 years, later from 16 years, were employed and took an oath in order to carry out these deliveries. They occupied an area in the office away from the regular postal staff.
- 4. Messengers were paid monthly a sum equal to 80% of the total value of the Special Delivery stamps on the items delivered, subject to a maximum sum of \$30. Each Messenger was allocated a book to record each letter delivered, subject to

examination by an Inspector in the department. Any reason for non-delivery had to be recorded and the item marked "Forwarded, delivery fee paid at first office". If an addressee had advised the Post Office of a change of address in advance, the item had to be forwarded in the next post and marked "Forward, fee not claimed".

5. The hours of Special Delivery were either 7am to 7pm or 7am to 11pm.

Stanley Gibbons *Stamps of the World*, under USA, illustrates E117 - Messenger on a bicycle - and the year 1917 with SG number E529. Michael Goodman, Editor of *Stamp Lover*, kindly provided me with a copy of the information on the bicycle stamp from Scott's Specialised USA stamp catalogue which provides far more detail.

The first bicycle messenger Special Delivery 10 cent ultramarine stamp, with shades, E6 was issued December 9, 1902. It had a double line watermark USPS and was perforated 12. In addition to the prices for a single mint and used stamp and on cover, prices are quoted for shades, blocks of 4, blocks of 6, plate blocks of 6 and marginal strips of 3 mint and never hinged mint. The earliest date known of the stamp on cover is January 15, 1903.

A smaller Green Special Delivery stamp was issued on December 12, 1908 described as "Helmet of Mercy" or "Merry Widow". This stamp proved to be unpopular and was replaced with a reprint of the bicycle stamp on 8 January, 1911, renumbered E8. The colour remained as before as ultramarine, with shades and perf 12 but the watermarked paper had a single line USPS. The earliest date known E8 on cover is January 14, 1911.

Further issues of the bicycle Special Delivery stamp followed. E9 was issued in September 1914, with a single line USPS watermark, but perf. 10. This was printed in plates of 200 and 4 panes of 50. The earliest known use of this stamp on cover is October 26, 1914. E10 was issued on October 19, 1916, still ultramarine with shades but on unwatermarked paper and perf. 10. This is the scarcest of the bicycle stamps. The earliest known date of use on cover is November 4, 1916. The final bicycle Special Delivery stamp was issued on May 2, 1917 on unwatermarked paper but perf.11. The stamp was in use until the next Special Delivery stamp was issued on July 12 1922 with an illustration of a motorcycle.



















BELOW: 1929 Letter-card with imprint 1fr 50c Chaplain stamp used 22.07.29





There is no message inside; the reply card has not been opened and the reply section is still attached. It was used philatelically. The wording on the back confirms delivery by cycle mesenger althought the reference to the Paris Districts is not applicable.





#### BOOKS ON CYCLING.

With Christmas fast approaching here are a few books, one or two of which you may wish to add to your library. Jordi Quntana has included a wide range of philatelic books to help the philatelist. These are simply background books which can inspire additions to a thematic stamp collection on Cycling.

1. Mc Gurn, James. On Your Bicycle: An Illustrated History of Cycling, London: John Murray (Publishing) Ltd, 1987. ISBN 0-7195-4378-9. Hardback 208 pages 245 X 170mm well illustrated.

The 8 chapters start with details of Karl von Drais 1818 "draisienne" or walking machine. It includes a reference to Kirkpatrick Macmillan's 1840 two wheel machine with drive to the back wheel by treadles. Chapters on the Michaux front wheel drive, the High Wheel bicycle, the tricycle and safety bicycle follow. The book is indexed, gives source notes and fully illustrated.

- 2. Ritchie, Andrew. King of the Road: An Illustrated History of Cycling. London: Wildwood House Ltd 1975. ISBN paperback 0 7045 0109 0 and Berkeley California: Ten Speed Press, 1975. ISBN paperback 0-91 3668-41-9, 192 pages 275 X 205mm, an Index and lists over 60 books on cycling including H G Wells "The Wheels of Chance", published 1896.
- 3. Bathurst, Bella *The Bicycle Book*, Hammersmith, London: Harper Press, 2011. ISBN 978-0-00-730588-9. Hardback 306 pages, 225 X 140mm, with 16 pages full colour and a few black and white illustrations. It has a glossary of bicycle terms, a bibliography of about 40 books and lists several websites. This is a collection of stories which "offer us a brilliantly engaging portrait of cycling's past present and world conquering future. The result is a story of passion and obsession, of exultation, endeavour and risk. Above all, it is a story of a partnership between man and machine, perfectly balance a story of love and souplesse." Souplesse is defined in the Glossary as "A French term incorporating the idea of suppleness and flexibility in motion, but conveying much more than that grace, harmony, flow".
- 4. Fitzpatrick, Jim *The Bicycle in Wartime: An Illustrated History* Virginia USA, Brassey's Inc, 1998 ISBN 1-57488-157-4 Softback 241 pages 250 X 190mm, black and white photos, researched extensively. The first chapter, "The Experimental Years", describes the development of the bicycle from Von Drais' draisienne to the military safety bicycle of 1899. The 26<sup>th</sup> Middlesex (Cyclist) Volunteer Corps, established Feb 1888 was the earliest British military cyclist unit. The second chapter covers The Boer War, which proved the practical uses of the bicycle for laying tele-communication lines, carrying the wounded and patrolling railway lines with specialized war cycles. However, Army Commanders were reluctant to accept the use of the bicycle instead of the horse even at the start of the First World War, 1914. Succeeding chapters describe the use of cyclists by German, Japanese and Vietnam armed forces. The final chapter is headed "History, Obsolescence and Perceptions.
- 5. Burrows, John My World on Wheels: the posthumous autobiography of Russell Mockridge, London: Stanley Paul & Co. Ltd, 1960. No ISBN. Hardback 235 pages, 215 X 135mm. About 20 glossy black & white photographs. Russell began writing the book on his cycle racing life from 1946 to 1958, in May 1958, assisted by his friend, Melbourne journalist, John Burrows. On

# The Bicycle in Wartime

September 13, 1958, Russell was killed whilst taking part in a Road race in a Melbourne suburb. In his relatively short career he had won two gold medals at Auckland's Empire Games and two Olympic Gold Medals at Helsinki. In 1955 he was the first Australian to complete the Tour de France post-war and he also won the Paris Six-day race with countrymen Patterson and Arnold.

6. Oakley, William Winged Wheel: The history of the first hundred years of the Cyclists' Touring Club, Godalming Surrey, Cyclists' Touring Club, 1977, ISBN 0 902237 10 1.

248 pages, 220 x 135mm, over 70 black and white photographs and 9 or 10 pencil drawings by Frank Patterson. The Index spreads over 7 pages in two columns. The Prologue commences, "This is a play about what has happened since the curtain went up in 1878 on the first Touring Club in the World.

"Queen Victoria was on the throne, Britannia ruled the waves; the sun never set on the Union Jack, income tax was six pence in the pound. The Safety Bicycle had not arrived to bring men down from their Olympian perch on Grand Old Ordinaries to ride as ordinary mortals.

"Like other plays it has passed through times of popularity and times of public indifference; but, after one hundred years it is still running. It is an amateurs' play, faithfully serviced by a small body of retainers. Actors innumerable have made their entrances and exits, but always enough have been on stage for the play to go on."

The book contains a wealth of information but is easy reading.

- 7. Wilkinson-Latham, Robert. *Cycles in Colour*. Poole, Dorset, Blandford Press Ltd, 1978. ISBN 0713708530. 195 pages, 200 X 135mm, including 113 colour photographs of bicycles. After 100 pages of the history of the bicycle, there are illustrations of the Hobby horse, the Boneshaker, Ordinaries, 'Dwarf' Ordinaries, Quadricycles, Tricycles, tandems, the safety Bicycle to 1900, the Bicycle as a War Horse 1875-1945 and The Bicycle since 1900.
- 8. Roberts, Derek, Cycling History Myths and Queries. John Pinkerton, November 1991 ISBN 0 9507431 5 1. Hardback 99 pages, 235 X 155mm; black and white illustrations throughout; a detailed two page Bibliography and a 9-page index in 2 columns. In the Introduction the author suggests that anyone seeking information about the history of cycling should start by reading two books King of the Road by Andrew Ritchie and On Your Bicycle by James McGurn. The book is unusual in that it consists of 167 questions, followed by an answer to each by Derek Roberts. The first question is "Why are the bicycles of the 1860s and early 1870s called boneshakers?" and ends at 167, "Were cycle-wheels ever built with cane rims?" The short answer was "No".
- 9. Whittle, Jerem, Le Tour. A Century of the Tour de France. Hammersmith, London, Collins, 2003. ISBN 0 00 7165943, a weighty hardback, 256 pages, 285 X 250mm.

The book consists of 10-year chapters and relies heavily on full pages of photographs, mainly in black and white but in full colour from the end of the 1970s. It ends with statistics and lists of every Yellow Jersey winner from 1903, Green Jersey (Points) winner from 1953 and Polka Dot (King of the Mountains) Jersey from 1933 to 2002, with an extensive Index.

The book lists Lance Armstrong as the winner of the Yellow Jersey from 1999-2002, before he was stripped of all titles for drug-taking, despite consistently denying it for years. It is interesting that Greg LeMond, the first USA winner of Le Tour in 1989 and 1990, makes no reference to Lance Armstrong in his Foreword. The author does refer to Lance Armstrong as a former cancer-

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sufferer who had dominated the Tour since 1999 but continued "The uncompromising Armstrong may have little time for the niceties of French cultural history or the Tour's genteel traditions but in terms of developing the race's global appeal his emphatic wins have been a resounding marketing success. Not that Desgrange (the Tour's founder) would have much time for a rider who barely speaks French, rides conservatively for most of the season and who once observed, a little dismissively, that 'the Tour is a bike race —not a popularity contest."

10. Beeley, Serena *A History of Bicycles: From Hobby Horse to Mountain Bike*, London, Studio Editions Ltd. 1992. ISBN 1851707530 hardback 144 pages 297 X 228mm.

The author studied the history of design at Manchester University and had been Curator of the National Cycle Museum at Lincoln for three years. The book follows the pattern of the other books with a similar title listed above but expands on the participation of women cyclists in racing and leisure cycling. There are references to the recumbent cycle, the 1991 Moulton, the Bickerton folding cycle and illustrations of stunt riding on BMX bikes. There are numerous examples of advertising, especially of the older bicycles on postcards.

11. Augendra, Jacques *Fausto Coppi*, Barnes, London, Bromley Books. 1999. ISBN 0-9531729-6-1 hard back, 155 pages 300 X 240 mm.

Originally published in France by Calman-Lévy, 1997.

Fausto-Angelo Coppi, born 15 September 1919 died 2 January 1960 of malaria, contracted on a cycling trip to Upper Volta and wrongly treated by his doctor. He was a national hero in the eyes of the Italian people. His funeral took place in the old church of Campo Santo but the chapel was far too small to accommodate all his friends and admirers. It was estimated that 30,000 people stood on the hill of Castellania to render homage to Coppi. The book contains many large black and white photographs of moments in his illustrious career.

12 Ballantine and Grant, Richard and Richard. *Richards' Ultimate Bicycle Book* Dorling Kindersley, 1992 ISBN 0-86318-659-9 hardback 192 pages 275 X 220mm fully illustrated in colour throughout with a glossary and detailed Index.

This is a practical book which commences with a chapter on The Essential Bike. This includes Bike Anatomy with an illustration of a bicycle with a derailleur gear, spread across a page and a half and a name against approximately 70 parts. Sections follow, in great detail, of the Mountain Bike, the Racing Bike, the Touring Bike, the Everyday Bike and the Future Bike. It ends with a thorough section on Cycle Maintenance. There are tips on the right clothing to wear and on learning to ride, with examples of children's bikes.

13. Street, Roger *The Pedestrian Hobby-Horse: At the Dawn of Cycling* Christchurch Dorset: Artesius Publications, 1998 ISBN 0 9532722 0 6. hardback 195 page 245 X 175mm with black and white illustrations throughout and a few colour plates.

The author is a retired senior partner of a firm of solicitors with a spare time interest in, and collector of, veteran cycles. He has examined, checked and re-checked almost every word written on the subject and provided a fascinating story with much new information.



Dear Sir.

Our agent, Mr H Pullan, Cirencester, has complained to us of the band which fitted to your tyre and which went wrong. We desire to explain to you that owing to the very large demand which we had for the bands immediately we placed them on the market we had to have some few of them made outside our own factory by special contract to keep pace with the demand. Unfortunately a few of these were not properly made and the one fitted to your tyre must have been one of this lot. We very much regret the annoyance it must have caused you and are sending Mr Pullan one of our latest bands which he will fit to your tyre free of charge. We would mention that we have now extensive arrangements to turn out sufficient bands in our own factories when we can make them under careful supervision and be sure of the resin and chemicals are mixed in proper proportions to prevent any of the bands from going wrong. The improved band is covered with a very thin rubber sheeting which is in many respects a very great improvement.
